

The aft area features a unique, mezzanine-style layout, with a raised cockpit creating a sea-facing space elevated above the water along. The foldable aft wings on both sides create a truly enviable beach style swim platform which acts as a seamless door to the ocean . The foredeck and upper deck also offer room for outdoor relaxation, with the upper deck boasting a panoramic terrace with plenty of space freestanding furnishings and decor.



CABO's main deck has several noteworthy amenities in addition to a sprawling, sumptuous owner's suite, such as the lounge and bar area, as well as a private entertainment area. Below deck are four beautifully appointed guest suites, comprising two VIP cabins and two twin cabins.

CABO is equipped with four MTU 16-cylinder 2600 HP engines. The hydro-jet propulsion assures excellent performance levels, both at cruising speeds of up to 35 knots and her maximum speed of 38 knots. The domotics and electronic systems are all state-of-the-art and fuse together performance with well-being and relaxation. Three Seakeeper 35's quarantee absolute comfort even while at anchor.










YOUR LUXURIOUS CHARTER EXPERIENCE

It is a Central European and Mediterranean country, bordered by the Adriatic Sea to the west. Croatia shares borders with Italy, Slovenia, Hungary, Serbia, Bosnia & Herzegovina, and Montenegro. The longest land border it shares with Bosnia, and the longest sea border, it shares with Italy.

Along the coast, you can expect dry, hot, and sunny summers, and mild, although sometimes wet, winters. Weather along the south Adriatic region of Dalmatia is generally drier and sunnier than in the

northern Adriatic region of Istria.

With a surface of just over 56.000
m2, Croatia is rather a small country.
However, due to its geographical location, geomorphological and ecological conditions, as well as to its climate, in terms of biodiversity, Croatia is one of the richest countries in Europe. From Paklenica climbing sites, beautiful beaches of central Dalmatia, great food of Istria, Croatia's fabulous wines, partying on the islands, sailing the Adriatic, Croatia has a lot to offer to its visitors.



Split - Zadar (5h of night cruising)



The city of **Split** in Croatia amazes with a wide range of fabulous things to do, with spectacular attractions, many historical and cultural treasures, and magnificent beaches. The charming city centre, including the world-famous Diocletian's Palace, has been on the list of UNESCO World Heritage Sites since 1979 and is therefore a real magnet for visitors. But it is not only in the Old Town that you will find plenty of places worth seeing, there are also many interesting attractions in the area surrounding Split.



Zadar in Croatia is the second-largest city in Dalmatia and one of the most popular holiday destinations in the country.

There are so many wonderful things to see and to do in Zadar! The unique old town with its 3,000-year-old history is particularly fascinating with its countless historical buildings and the numerous important attractions worth exploring. The Romanesque forum, the famous Sea Organ and the magnificent cathedral are just a few of the best attractions in the city centre.

Zadar - Šibenik / Skradin (4h of cruising)



Šibenik in Croatia is a true jewel on the Croatian Adriatic and one of the most interesting cities on the coast of Dalmatia. During a holiday, there are so many things to do, and you will enjoy the indescribably beautiful ambience of the medieval old town. You walk through winding stone streets and discover wonderful attractions, such as the UNESCO World Heritage Site. the Šibenik Cathedral of St. James. Above the 44,000- inhabitant city, there are old fortresses which offer visitors a wonderful view over the sheltered bay. But also having a nice swim is possible in Šibenik, and so you can find some beautiful beaches for swimming and relaxing around the city. Perfect for a memorable holiday or short city tour.



Skradin is 55 kilometers northeast of Split and 11 kilometers north of Šibenik, two very popular destinations on the Dalmatian Coast. The town lies on the Krka River, at a point in the river that is so wide, it almost makes Skradin feel like a seaside town. The town is the gateway to Krka National Park, one of Croatia's premier scenic attractions.

Šibenik / Skradin / Krka waterfall – Kornati National Park s (1h15 of cruising)



Kornati National Park is called a "nautical paradise" thanks to its incomparable and unique beauty. The park Kornati is an archipelago of 89 gorgeous islands, islets, and reefs in the northern part of Dalmatia, near Dugi Otok, Pašman, Murter, Zadar, and Šibenik. Like Brijuni National Park, Kornati National Park is comprised of both land and sea. The park has a true summer "olive climate", warm with hot and dry summers, and some rain in the autumn. Fields, paths, and charming stone walls make Kornati National Park a popular destination for tourists and locals alike. There are no residents on the Kornati islands, making it a wild destination for exploring.



There's plenty of wildlife to see in the Kornati archipelago, but a lot of it is hard to spot. This includes reptiles (snakes and lizards) and birds (eagle owls, buzzards, peregrine falcons, kestrels). But the true attraction here is what goes on under the water, where brightly coloured fish, moray eels, and crustaceans dart in and out of caves and grottos, among coral and sponges.



Kornati National Park - Kaprije (1h15 of cruising)



Kaprije is an island in the middle of the Šibenik archipelago. It is a mustvisit destination for boaters sailing in nearby waters as well as a frequent choice and the perfect stop for those sailing between Split and Kornati. It was named after the caper bush, a Mediterranean plant with edible fruits and buds which are used to decorate plates. This pearl of an island in the Sibenik archipelago is completely riddled with tiny paths trodden by the locals so that they could reach their farms more easily, since Kaprije is primarily an island of farmers, where fishing is inevitable. This indented island was not inhabited until the 15th century and experienced a surge in settlers in the following century. At the time, Kaprije was an oasis providing salvation to the people of Šibenik, who had sought shelter from Ottoman incursions.



The local taverns exude hospitality, a quality which is prevalent in the entire Šibenik region, while standout culinary specialities of the island include a variety of multiculoured risotto and whitefish

Kaprije – Korčula (5h30 of night cruising)



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Korčula – Polače / Mljet (3h30 of cruising)



Polače is on the northern coast of Mljet Island at the end of a deep and isletsheltered bay. As Polače is next to one of the main entrances to Mljet National Park, it receives a fair amount of visitors. in the summer Melimoyu Volcano used to have four points. In the local language of Mapundungun, it translates to meli meaning "four," and moyu meaning "udders." However, two of these points no longer exist as they were lost during a strong earthquake or volcanic activity, depending on who you ask. Yet, even at the height of the season. Polače retains the air of a traditional Mediterranean fishing village. The offshore islets - Tajnik, Moracnik, Ovrar and Kobrava - make the bay views most scenic



Polače has an ancient history. You can see the ruins of a palace that was probably built in the 5th century. The ground-floor plan was rectangular with two prominent towers facing the sea. Alongside the highest wall of the palace are village houses and the remains of an early-Christian church.

Polače / Mljet – Broce / Ston (1h30 of cruising)



The medieval town of Ston is situated at the beginning of the Peljesac peninsula and is probably one of the best travel destinations in Croatia. This historical place is especially famous for its impressive 5.5 km long wall, which connects the town of Ston with the small dreamy town of Mali Ston. The tasty oysters from Mali Ston Bay are among the best delicacies in the world. Beautiful and interesting is also a walk through the historic alleys of the old town, and a visit to the salt works, where salt has been produced for almost 2000 years. Only about 4 kilometers from Ston is the beach Prapratno, a beautiful natural beach, which has already been ranked as one of the best sandy beaches in Croatia by many magazines!



Probably the most important attraction in Ston is the imposing wall. With a length of around 5,500 meters, it is the longest defence wall after the Chinese wall and, thus, one of the most important structures in Croatia. The construction of the mighty wall of Ston began as early as 1333, when the island of Peljesac joined the Republic of Dubrovnik. However, the fortification was not completed until 400 years later. In addition to the foundation walls, this fortification included 3 forts, 7 bastions and 41 towers, some of which are still well-preserved.

Broce / Ston – Dubrovnik (1h30 of cruising)



Dubrovnik is a small town with just over 40.000 inhabitants where almost everybody knows everybody. Dubrovnik is a must-see destination in Croatia. You don't necessarily need to stay overnight in Dubrovnik, but if you are visiting Croatia, you have to visit Dubrovnik. It is a wonderfully preserved medieval town with beautiful architecture, rich history, 2 km long city walls encompassing the old town, lovely beaches, good restaurants, and buzzing bars.



Dubrovnik is full of history. A UNESCO World Heritage Site, the old town is perfectly preserved, and full of wonderful Renaissance, Gothic, and Baroque palaces, churches, and monasteries. Often considered a museum town, Dubrovnik is also a town full of museums. Many museums are small, and dedicated to the history of Dubrovnik, and the region. We particularly recommend the small ethnographic museum Rupe and Gornji Ugao Tower.

Dubrovnik is also a beach town where swimming, suntanning, and just lazing in the sun is essential part of summer life.
